Too many young people in Australia are coping with experiences like homelessness, family breakdown or domestic violence during a critical time in their lives as they transition from childhood to adulthood. Young people need more than a roof over their heads to break cycles of trauma or crisis that are often intergenerational.

Foyers create a pathway to independence, offering a safe and stable home for up to two years, integrated learning and work supports, and a trusted community of peers and adults. When we promote their talents and aspirations, young people gain the confidence they need to realise their goals in life.

Investing for growth

Our commitment to young people

We value the knowledge and insights of young people who have lived in Youth Foyers and learnt how to navigate the broader service landscape to get the supports they need. In 2022, Foyer Foundation engaged and employed ten Youth Ambassadors to create the avenue for young people to influence our strategy, key programs and partners. Youth Ambassadors were involved in the preparations for our National Foyer conference, the development of the national outcomes framework, and the Foyer accreditation assessment process.

These agents for change are not just taking charge of their own lives, they are using their voices to positively impact the lives of others.

Youth Ambassadors from across our national Foyer network advocate on issues that matter to them: mental health, the representation of First Nations communities, LGTBOI inclusion, and growing the Youth Foyer movement so that more young people can experience the same opportunities. We respect and elevate their voices, creating supported experiences for Youth Ambassadors to speak at public events and shape policy and practice.

The Foyer Foundation is committed to ensuring young people are at the heart of our movement in Australia, and the Youth Ambassador program is the first step in our journey.





The Foyer Foundation's journey and vision to grow the number of Youth Foyers for young people in Australia has been a focus for nearly a decade.

In the last year we have made significant progress towards bringing this vision to life – by setting up what we need to be successful in any community in Australia where young people need us to be.

Growing Foyers is first and foremost about growing our impact for young people - so that as Foyers multiply we can see more young people creating their future.

In 2021, Foyer Foundation was emboldened by strong support from the Paul Ramsay Foundation.

This level of financial support makes Foyers forever stronger and along with the contributions made by Foyer 5000 our family of supporters – the Foundation has set the scene for long term growth and sustainability with an ambition to grow to 50 Youth Foyers by 2030 - a shared vision we will drive with young people, Foyer communities and further investment from all levels of government and other partners.

A unified vision for Youth Foyers, where young people can be supported anywhere in Australia means we can celebrate the fact that we are growing the number of private sector funding partners. This type of financial support makes up 90% of our income. We are particularly proud in the year to June 2022 of the corporate partnership with Australian Finance Group, which I am pleased to report was extended in May this year for a further three years.

Growth of course is not our only focus. Working with community service organisations and Foyer operators, we have continued to build on our work in setting and improving standards that all accredited Australian Foyers work to.

With the Foyer network of community service organisations and providers, we have the knowledge, evidence and experience to grow at the right pace, with everything we do held against high standards and involving strong ownership from the young people we exist to support.

Every young person should have the opportunity to live life to their full potential and shape their own future.

Many people we work with describe experiences that narrow young people's choices, undermine their sense of confidence and hope, and leave them feeling powerless.

By embracing a young person's sense of agency and power, providing a home and the supports needed to achieve learning and work goals, Foyers enable young people to take charge of their futures. Each young person learns how to navigate the complex web of support services, schools, TAFEs, universities and employment with confidence within two years. While a young person's stay in a Foyer is finite, it creates outcomes that last for the rest of their lives.

None of this would be possible without the hard work of every single case worker, manager and leader that practice Advantaged Thinking in Foyers across Australia, partnering with young people to unlock each person's potential in life. Without your dedication, optimism and depth of experience, the Foyer movement in Australia would not have the credibility and outcomes it is known for globally. Your work is changing the lives of over 500 young people each year. rewiring communities to create a sense of belonging for young people and see them for their talents and potential.

And yet, with over 44,000 young people continuing to present to specialist homelessness services alone each year,

I know we still have much more work ahead of us.

Our bold ambition to grow the Foyer movement to 50 Youth Foyers by 2030 is an important marker of our shared commitment to the road ahead.

Young people, service providers, housing providers, philanthropists, impact investors and corporate partners are pooling their efforts, resources and data to expand the reach of Youth Foyers in Australia - so that more young people experiencing homelessness can shape their pathway to independence. The role of the Foyer Foundation is to join up this diverse network to catalyse growth of the Foyer movement in Australia.

When I joined the team in July 2022, I joined a national movement that has endured for over ten years and has now entered a catalytic chapter in its history. I have enormous respect for the work of the Foyer network to date, my predecessors, our Board, our partners and our small but mighty core team that drives this collective effort. Our Chair Keith Bryant has provided steady stewardship, leadership and continuity for over a decade.

Our bold ambition



Our bold ambition is to grow to 50 Youth Foyers by 2030. Under One Roof is our national campaign to make it happen.

Growing the number of Youth Foyers in Australia will enable more young people who have experiences of crisis and homelessness to take charge of their futures, embrace their potential and flourish.

We have everything it takes to grow the Foyer movement in Australia, including a strong track record and a network of people across organisations and sectors who are committed to our common purpose.

Under One Roof enables us to join up our efforts and collaborate through:

 A community campaign to raise awareness and invite people to be part of our bold ambition for growth

- A powerful and growing national evidence base
- A new social and economic story of impact
- The collective knowledge, skills and experience across the Foyer Network
- A commitment to continuous learning and innovation.

Collectively we will advocate, co-design, and bring new evidence of the impact of Youth Foyers to life. We aim to raise awareness of the Youth Foyer approach and provide a platform to share the lived experience of young people who are advocating to build more Youth Foyers in their communities and across Australia.



The Foyer landscape in 2022

There are 13 established Youth Foyers across Australia, with another 33 communities working hard to establish a Youth Foyer right now.

We uphold high standards of integrity in the Youth Foyer approach through our Foyer accreditation process, which assesses many aspects of a service from the physical environment through to the team, culture, practice and policies. This process ensures all Youth Foyers embed an Advantaged Thinking philosophy and practice, promoting people's strengths rather than defining them by their deficits. Australia's 13 established Youth Foyers include 9 that have been accredited and 4 in the final stages of accreditation.

The 33 communities seeking to establish a new Youth Foyer recognise and value the Foyer approach as an evidence-based, integrated solution for young people in their local area. Moving from local appetite for a Foyer through to the implementation of a high quality, accredited Foyer does not happen overnight. All communities will take a different path to get there based on their local context and resources.

In partnership with the Brotherhood of St Laurence, we identified five common stages in the development journey to better understand the emerging Foyer landscape and provide more targeted supports to communities throughout this journey.

Supporting communities to build investment readiness and accelerate their Foyer development journey will enable thousands more young people at risk across Australia to reach their potential.



Emerging Youth Foyers



Community scoping

Communities are interested in establishing a Foyer. They are investigating the approach, building a business case, seeking investment.



Developing

A community has funding approval and is now in the process of developing/ converting the service model and building.



Embedding

Doors to the emerging Foyer are open! The service is actively using the Advantaged Thinking model, collecting data, and working towards the Foyer accreditation journey in 12–18 months time.

Established Youth Foyers



Accrediting

After at least 12 months of operation, the Foyer is ready and committed to the 13 month accreditation process. This is a phase of active learning, reflection and continuous improvement.



Accredited

An accredited Foyer is trusted to deliver high-quality outcomes for young people through a robust approach.



Re-accreditation every 4 years

Foyers apply for reaccreditation every four years after their initial accreditation was confirmed and have up to 12 months to complete the process.





80% of residents exit Foyer into stable housing, with 72% of young people exiting into private housing.

The Foyer Foundation led the formation of FoyerInvest to accelerate the growth and impact of Youth Foyers, bringing together committed service providers with others across the network.

This Consortium aims to support the Foyer network by securing ongoing funding needed to drive the expansion of the Foyer approach, unlocking private investment and combining it with funding from Federal, State and Territory Governments.

Co-convenors Keith Bryant and Jan Owen AM launched FoyerInvest in late 2021. Since then, our FoyerInvest partners have shaped the national ambition for 50 Youth Foyers by 2030, channelling the efforts of each organisation towards three shared priorities:

 Strengthening the evidence base through a national outcomes measurement approach

- Developing new investment models through impact investment
- Aligning the way we communicate and advocate for change.

These three workstreams are brought together through our national campaign, *Under One Roof*, creating a compelling case for growth. A sequence of advocacy materials is in development that will include a national evidence base led by the Brotherhood of St Laurence; analysis of the social and economic return on investment of Youth Foyers led by Accenture; and a viable model for impact investment led by For Purpose Investment Partners.

FoyerInvest

Our FoyerInvest partners have contributed significant time and resources to this collective effort. We celebrate their commitment to collaboration, learning and innovation in pursuit of better life outcomes for young people across Australia. The momentum for expanding the Youth Foyer movement in Australia is now well under way, and we welcome more organisations across Australia to join in.

Beyond Foyer

Foyer residents remain a valued and loved part of the Foyer community after transitioning to independence, often saying that living in a Foyer provided them with a sense of belonging and connection.

After graduation, some residents stay in touch with their youth worker and local Foyer, but yearn for opportunities to maintain this sense of connection with peers and the broader Foyer network as they navigate independent life.

In 2022, we began scoping and piloting a Foyer alumni program that could respond to this gap: The Beyond Foyer Project. This project is designed to provide a way for alumni to maintain connection with a national network of peers post-Foyer, create leadership development opportunities, and offer work placement and employment experiences. Foyer alumni would have opportunities to play a central role in shaping the ongoing development and strategy of the Foyer Network – even after leaving their Foyer.

We are piloting this project in Victoria, with ambitions for a national alumni network. We are exploring possibilities to harness the insights and knowledge of the alumni network to better understand the evolving needs of young people as they move through the Foyer program and track life outcomes over time.

With the appointment of a project manager and four youth consultants, key highlights in 2022 include a codesign day with Foyer alumni and cohosting and presenting at the National Fover Conference.

Paul Ramsay Foundation Partnership

Our partnership with the Paul Ramsay Foundation (PRF) has spurred a new phase of maturity and growth for the Foyer movement in Australia.

PRF's commitment to breaking cycles of disadvantage has led to their investment in Youth Foyers as an evidence-based solution with potential to scale. Contributing \$4 million over three years, PRF's grant supports the ongoing evolution of the Foyer Foundation and the establishment of the FoyerInvest Consortium as a catalyst for growth.

Core to our partnership with PRF is the development of a national outcomes framework that will provide a rigorous evidence base now and into the future. PRF's contributions will also support a robust impact investment mechanism and engagement with policymakers at state and federal levels.

We value the opportunity to partner with a philanthropic organisation that is deeply committed to improving long-term outcomes for young people and understands how complex the service landscape is for a young person experiencing homelessness or crisis.

In early 2022 The Foyer Foundation was delighted to extend the partnership with Australian Finance Group Ltd (AFG) for a further three years.

AFG, one of Australia's largest networks of mortgage brokers, will provide \$600,000 to the Foyer Foundation from 2022–2024, building on the \$200,000 provided when they became principal partner in 2021.

The sponsorship focuses on three key pillars of support – strategic growth, Foyer learning and development, and the AFG Independence Fund.

AFG CEO David Bailey said the new funding aims to give the Foyer Foundation the added certainty and security it needed when planning into the future.

Grant Family Philanthropy

The Foyer Foundation has a deep relationship with Grant Family Philanthropy (GFP) that spans five years and multiple donations, beginning with a \$25,000 contribution that enabled the Foundation to appoint our first Executive Director in 2017.

GFP's founder John Grant strongly believes in the Foyer approach to backing young people and his visit to the Shepparton Foyer in 2019 was instrumental to his decision to provide ongoing support.

From 2019, GFP offered to contribute \$100,000 per annum for three years if the Foundation could leverage a matching contribution from another philanthropist. This incentive sparked additional donor relationships and enabled the Foundation to reach new working capital targets.

GFP's contributions have enabled the Foyer Foundation to build our core capabilities and deliver a national Foyer conference in Perth in 2018. Most recently, GFP's generous donations enabled The Foyer Foundation to undertake the first Australian analysis of the social and economic return on investment in Youth Foyers. This evidence base provides critical building block for our case for growth and investment in Youth Foyers and will have ripple effects for years to come.

The Foyer Foundation continued to operate on a sound financial footing during the FY 2022 with appropriate and prudent controls in place. The Foundation receives no government funding. Total revenue for the year was \$1.1m, total comprehensive income was \$0.23m and total equity was \$0.46m.

The last financial year challenged us all within the Fover Foundation – the impact of COVID-19, the corresponding deferral of our national Youth Foyer conference, and changes in the executive team - however, our focus on supporting existing Youth Foyers and our work towards 50 accredited Youth Foyers by 2030 remained unchanged.

The past financial year saw us continue to invest in people as a priority. Our overall financial situation was enhanced by the Paul Ramsay Foundation investment, the support of AFG and the AFG Independence Fund that provided microgrants to over 140 young people in 2022. The generosity of philanthropists and the Foyer 5000 donors were central in all our efforts.

2023 promises to be another strong year with the same focus on disrupting the cycle of disadvantage by emphasising the inherent talents within each and every person in the Fover network.




